Executive Summary

AB 2689, introduced by Assembly Member Bains and coauthored by Assembly Member Kalra during the 2023-2024 Regular Session of the California Legislature, seeks to amend Section 18766 of the Revenue and Taxation Code. This bill proposes an extension of the operation of the California Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Research Voluntary Tax Contribution Fund until January 1, 2030, with a potential further extension to 2032, provided that the fund meets its minimum annual contribution threshold of \$250,000.

The California Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementia Research Voluntary Tax Contribution Fund was initially established to allow taxpayers to designate a specified amount from their personal income tax return, in excess of their tax liability, to support Alzheimer's and related dementia research. These contributions are allocated to the State Department of Public Health, which awards grants to eligible programs under criteria established by the State Department of Public Health's Alzheimer's Disease Program.

The proposed extension of this fund is crucial for continuing research and development in the prevention, treatment, and understanding of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias. Given the aging population in California, the impact of such research extends significantly to senior citizens, who are most susceptible to these conditions. Funding through taxpayer contributions ensures ongoing support for innovative programs that can lead to breakthroughs in care and potential cures, directly benefiting a significant portion of the state's senior population.

In summary, AB 2689 not only supports the fiscal sustainability of Alzheimer's and dementia research programs but also represents a continued commitment to addressing the growing impact of these diseases on California's senior citizens. The bill ensures that crucial research can continue without interruption, bolstering efforts to improve health outcomes for older adults and providing hope to many families affected by these debilitating conditions. This legislation reflects a proactive approach to public health and senior care, advocating for advancements that can significantly improve the quality of life for our elderly population.
