Executive Summary

Assembly Bill No. 2680 (AB 2680), introduced by Assembly Member Aguiar-Curry during the 2023-2024 Regular Session of the California Legislature, aims to enhance the support for individuals living with Alzheimer's disease and related conditions in California. The bill proposes significant updates to the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Advisory Committee, ensuring it can better serve the needs of affected individuals and their families.

AB 2680 seeks to rename the advisory committee to the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions Advisory Committee and expand its membership from 14 to between 21 and 25 members. This expansion ensures a more comprehensive representation, including individuals from various fields such as medical research, mental health, and legal expertise, as well as those directly affected by Alzheimer's and related conditions.

The bill emphasizes the importance of diverse representation by including members who have professional, lived, or academic expertise in aging-related areas. This diverse makeup aims to ensure the committee can effectively address the complex needs of the Alzheimer's community in California.

The revised duties of the committee include providing ongoing advice to the administration and Legislature, updating policy recommendations, and actively participating in the development of the State Plan on Aging. The committee will also meet quarterly to study and make recommendations on issues affecting individuals with Alzheimer's and related conditions.

AB 2680 further ensures that the committee's recommendations consider cultural and linguistic factors impacting diverse populations and include stakeholders such as family caregivers, community-based providers, and researchers. This approach aims to create more inclusive and effective support systems for those living with Alzheimer's disease and related conditions.

The bill also modernizes the committee's operations by clarifying its status as an "advisory commission" under the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act, subject to teleconferencing provisions. This change promotes transparency and accessibility, allowing the public to participate in the committee's work.

In summary, AB 2680 is a crucial measure to modernize and expand the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Conditions Advisory Committee.
