Executive Summary

SB 1396, introduced by Senator Alvarado-Gil during the 2023-2024 Regular Session of the California Legislature, amends Section 11330.6 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, relating to the California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids (CalWORKs) program and its Home Visiting Program. This bill extends the provisions of the CalWORKs Home Visiting Program to apply to children from birth up to their fifth birthday and allows voluntary participants to continue in the program even if they no longer meet the CalWORKs income, eligibility, or need criteria, for up to an additional 12 months.

The CalWORKs Home Visiting Program is designed to support positive health, development, and well-being outcomes for pregnant and parenting people, families, and infants born into poverty. It provides high-quality, evidencebased, culturally competent services for at least 24 months and up to the child's fifth birthday. The program aims to expand future educational, economic, and financial opportunities, improving the likelihood that participants will exit poverty.

SB 1396 ensures that more children and families can benefit from the program's comprehensive support services. By extending the age eligibility and duration of participation, the bill addresses the critical needs of at-risk families, enhancing the stability and development of children in their formative years. Additionally, it promotes continuity of care, ensuring that families receive consistent and reliable support even if their financial circumstances change.

This legislative change is significant as it provides a longer period of assistance to vulnerable families, which is crucial for their overall development and wellbeing. Importantly, the extended support also benefits senior citizens who often act as primary caregivers in households. By relieving some of the care duties with professional support services, seniors can experience reduced physical and emotional stress, contributing to improved quality of life and wellbeing. This targeted support for families thereby extends to enhance the lives of seniors, offering them relief and the ability to engage more fully in their communities and personal interests.
